# **Synopsis of Book**

This beautifully illustrated story lifts readers from one time zone to the next, visiting significant landmarks in most of the 24 time zones. As you travel through time, you visit every continent, experiencing a small taste of the culture and learning that something wonderful is happening in every part of the globe. The story concludes by tying the past to the present with directions for making a sundial. This work from mother-daughter writing team Gina Cascone and Bryony Sheppard and illustrator Olivia Beckman is sure to inspire conversations about all times of the day and night.

# Using a TeachersFirst® Reading Trek to Explore This Book

TeachersFirst Reading Treks create a virtual field trip of resources about a piece of literature or a text using the My Maps feature of Google Maps. To motivate and enrich student reading, teachers and students can reference this visual collection of web resources and images as they relate to the contents of a book.

TeachersFirst has done the hard work for you! Use the activities in this teacher guide and the accompanying <u>Reading Trek map</u> as you and your students explore this book. And, if you feel inspired, you (or your students) can create your own Reading Trek about this or another book!

# **Using This Reading Trek in Class**

Below is a list of ideas for how to use this Reading Trek in your educational setting.

#### Working with the Map:

- 1. Introduce the book to the whole class on an interactive whiteboard using the Reading Trek map and highlighting its various layers.
- 2. Using the illustrations on a given page, ask students to predict the time of day and possibly the season at greater latitudes.
- After identifying your time zone, use this <u>Where in the World Do You Live</u> activity PDF



to have students draw what may be happening at the selected time.

 Investigate shadows by placing various objects on photosensitive paper or use flashlights to create students' shadows or silhouettes. You can trace silhouettes on black paper using chalk dipped in water.

5. After listening to the story, ask students to use text clues to identify the missing pieces of the illustrations found in <u>Where in the World is the</u> <u>Missing Picture</u>?

#### **Extension Activities:**

- 1. Make a sundial using the directions in the text.
- Using the authors' <u>Incorporating Performing</u> <u>Arts</u> activity, ask pairs or groups of students to choose an alternative location in each time zone and use ABCya! Paint (<u>TeachersFirst</u> <u>review</u>) to produce a page for a class version of the story. Be sure to watch the tutorial video on <u>YouTube</u>.
- 3. Use strips of painters' tape on a globe to mark the time zones and discuss the need for the various time zones.
- Listen to jazz, bossa nova music, Thai classical music, and opera, then compare and contrast the different forms of music. ccMixter -Dig (<u>TeachersFirst review</u>) or Music Map (<u>TeachersFIrst review</u>) offer nice collections of music tracks for this activity.

6. View other illustrations by <u>Olivia Beckman</u> and discuss their similarities and differences.

- 5. In a music classroom setting, have students use percussion instruments to mimic the music genre identified in the text.
- 6. Find the hidden clocks on each page.
- 7. Take a virtual cable car ride through San Francisco using the videos "<u>San Francisco</u> <u>Cable Car Ride to Fisherman's Wharf</u>" or "<u>How</u> <u>to Ride a Cable Car in San Francisco</u>." Additional videos ("<u>A Trip Down Market Street,</u> <u>(1906), San Francisco Cable Cars (1929)</u>," and "<u>Cable Cars of San Francisco (1945)</u>") will tie the past to the present so students can compare and contrast this mode of transportation over time.
